Entry Requirements

Bachelors of Science in Real Estate Management & Valuation

To qualify for entry, applicants are required to possess:

 Five (5) subjects in the Caribbean Examination Council (CXC) general proficiency level 1, 2 or 3 (grade 3 acceptable since June 1998) or General Certificate of Education (GCE) grades A, B, C including English and Mathematics

Equivalent Qualifications

Applicants who possess qualifications obtained at accredited educational institutions, which are deemed as appropriate may gain entry to the course. If the applicant has higher qualifications, this will be considered and credit transfers or exemptions from some modules may be granted.

Additionally, applicants who possess an Associate Degree maybe considered.

Prior Learning Assessment

Persons who do not meet the normal entry requirements may apply for admissions via Prior Learning Assessment

Selection Interview

Applicants who fulfil the entry requirement may also be Asked to satisfy a final selection interview

The Course is concerned with the management and development of land within the economic, legal, sociological and technological framework of the country, and it provides a synthesis of skills covering the areas of land use, land management, land development, land valuation, land settlement and reform with the major element being valuation of properties. The curriculum has been developed with the input of practicing professionals to ensure that it meets industry standards and satisfy accreditation requirements of the University Council of Jamaica and the relevant professional associations.

The course aims to provide graduates with a foundation that will enable them to respond to the changes taking place in real estate and land economy, within the economic, legal, sociological and technological framework of societies.

The student/graduate is concerned not only with practical aspects of land management but also with the financial, legal, planning and policy contexts within which decisions are made and business interests managed.



Programme Structure & Duration

The course is offered over eight full-time semesters, providing students with knowledge and skills from the four main disciplines:

- Valuation
- · Investment Appraisal
- Real Estate and Property Management
- Land Management
