

CO-OP ED vs COVID-19



NAVIGATING NEW HORIZONS WITH WORK-INTEGRATED LEARNING

The World Association of Co-operative Education (WACE) held a virtual world conference May 11-13, 2021 under the theme, "Navigating New Horizons." The conference was convened by professionals and associates, in association with the University of Waterloo and focused on work-integrated learning (WIL) and its important role in the world of work. The higher education sector is facing unprecedented challenges in the way it teaches, researches, and engages with stakeholders. While COVID-19 began to spread across each country, more and more organizations including universities have responded by adjusting their products, services or operational approaches. Over the three-day period, the conference organizers utilised a blended approach to deliver the conference; synchronous (live) sessions and asynchronous (pre-recorded) sessions were used. The presenters shared research to support prominent ideas on how to navigate the compulsory change in society due to the COVID-19 pandemic. One of the main presentations was entitled, "Responding to COVID-19: Enriching students' responsible leadership through an online work-integrated learning project." This was presented by Dr Laura Rock. In the presentation, she stated that WIL is an umbrella term for a range of approaches that aim to connect the theory and practice of work within the curriculum. There are several variables that can be considered when classifying WIL activities. These may include the location (on or off campus), length of the activity (placement hours), whether academic credit is given for participation, the extent of community or industry engagement, or the purpose of the activity. Also, in her presentation, she stated that "In addition to these operational challenges, some scholars and experts are predicting that COVID-19 will have a negative effect on the mental and psychological health of students and university staff."

Dr Rock in her final remarks highlighted that from her study, she recognized that COVID-19 was changing both people's way of life and students' motivation. It was challenging our work-life balance with many people working from home and for many students. She, therefore, concluded that a new approach was needed, one that is founded on the principles of a student-centred approach, connectivism and building a community of inquiry.

This was designed to facilitate an alternative option for the Industrial Work Experience (IWE) programme and especially for final year students. The initiative was led by the then School IWE Coordinator with strong support from the SOE Management team and the Co-operative Education Unit.




In Summer 2020, Ms Paula Henry, Senior Lecturer in the Chemical Engineering Division, Dr Therese Chambers former SOE Head and Mr Percival Stewart, Civil Engineering Programme Director developed the first virtual design project under the leadership of the SOE IWE Coordinator. This initial idea was further expanded during the summer of the 2021 project implementation to incorporate smart lighting features and was designed for persons with physical challenges. The complexities of this and other projects required students and supervisors from diverse engineering disciplines. The project scope and deliverables covered content from at least two different courses of study. The selection of participants was drawn from a combination of engineering disciplines: chemical, civil, electrical, industrial, and mechanical.


Over six project teams participated in the SOE Industrial Work Experience (IWE) Alternative Assessment projects during summer 2021. Two top projects were selected to participate in the Industrial Engineering and Operation Management (IEOM) Society International conference held virtually in Indonesia from September 13 – 16, 2021. The two teams entered in the selected undergraduate competition categories did remarkably well, copping the first and third place awards.

The recipient of the 1st Place Award was selected from a group of 30 entries in the Undergraduate Student Paper Competition Sponsored by the SIEMENS project entitled "Solar Powered Swimming Pool with Smart Lighting System". During the competition, Mr Adrian Francis ably led the presentation and responded succinctly to questions from the judges confidently and remarkably. The other team members were Shavae Scale (team leader), Rohando Malcolm, Lamanja Ellis and Kemar Green. The team was supervised by Mr Glendon Lewis and Mr Junior Bennett, both lecturers in SOE. The 3rd Place Award recipient was chosen from a total of 14 entries in the Undergraduate Research Competition project entitled "Residential Swimming Pool Design with Smart Lighting System". Mr Pieter-Jon Williams team leader ably led the presentation and responded well to questions from the judges. The team was supervised by Mr Shanroy Dennis and Mr Junior Bennett, both lecturers in SOE.

The presenters Mr Adrian Francis and Mr Pieter-Jon Williams strategically incorporated the lessons learnt during their studies and preparation session and made history for UTech Ja and Jamaica. We are proud of the achievements and ambassadorship of the students from the School of Engineering. Their success is primarily due to their ambition, hard work, teamwork, commitment, and persistence. In addition, the supervision from devoted staff, strong support from SOE Management and the Cooperative Education Unit have all contributed to this international achievement. Today, we are all proud of the eminence attained and the ambassadorship. The success that we now enjoy adds credence to Helen Keller's words, "Alone we can do so little; together we can do so much".

CO-OP ED FEATURES RETHINKING WHAT IS POSSIBLE

Mastering her role as Co-op Ed School Coordinator, Mrs Brown Legister, covered the end-to-end process for internship in the Caribbean School of Sport Sciences. These included but were not limited to relaying information from the Co-operative Education Unit to students and partners, coordinating professional development workshops for students, contacting potential partners and sending packages upon confirmation of participation, informing students of their assigned hosts for the internship, conducting site visits with partners, analyzing feedback and preparing reports based students' on experiences.

When asked about the changes made during her stint as Coordinator, she modestly stated, "I would not credit anything I have done with the term change. I would instead say that it has been a process. I have had to learn about cooperative education and with learning comes improvement. What we have now is an improvement from where we started." Mrs Brown Legister made mentioned that COVID-19 had put a damper on her operations, as her school deals with physical sports. With no sports available due to social distancing mandates by the government, she had to rethink her process. While she didn't go into specifics, she stated that her internship partners made efforts to design work plans and report schedules for the interns. Designing such work plans were key to adapting to innovation in her eyes.

She exclaimed that the opportunity this position has granted her is a rewarding one, stating, "I feel like a proud mom when you hear the feedback of the student's performance on the job. It is also very satisfying when your students are offered employment upon completing their hours." She also stated that the partnerships formed with clients have become stronger due to the level of work her interns have produced.

In her final remarks, she recommended that the module be paid for by the university as it aids in professional development. She stated that this move would be good and would also be an appropriate introduction for students who will be pursuing the module in the future.

3: What has been your greatest accomplishment/ achievement, since assuming the current role you are in?


