

must also be acknowledged for their continued support of the work of the Co-op Ed Unit by engaging our students through a variety of modalities.



Round Table Talk: Opportunities for Professional Growth

the 2021/2022 academic year the Co-op Ed Unit launched a series titled "Round Table Talk". In this session students currently on internship and professional practice were invited to share their experiences on the job. Panelists included students from the School of Building and Land Management who were 3rd year Quantity Surveying students-Kingsley Mills, Rushawn Webb and Alex Smith.

In their discussion, they acknowledged that it is better to not rely solely on theory. Kingsley pointed out that while theory is crucial, many of the procedures and methods are frequently confronted from various angles in the field; therefore not everything he learned in school could be used immediately in the workplace. Rushawn also shared that he was able gain valuable experience in problem-solving techniques and task and time management skills, which proved useful in the workplace. Alex further mentioned that through this opportunity he has had the chance to network professionally and occasionally interact with the "movers and shakers" of his industry, which can lead to new opportunities for professional progress.

The students expressed gratitude for the chance the internship had given them to apply what they were taught, and shared that while "classroom instruction only simulates a tiny portion of the processes and techniques used on the job, internship experience gives then firsthand knowledge of how these are fully carried out".

Co-op Ed Fair - April 2022

he Co-op Ed Fair is an annual event at which students are given the opportunity to meet with industry representatives and potential employers in various fields. The Fair gives employers first hand exposure to high quality students who are eager and ready to make valuable contributions to their industries. The 2022 Fair partners included Jamaica Pegasus Hotel, Digicel Group, Couples Resort and KPMG, among others.

During the Fair, presentations focused on professional branding and creating a professional identity. The presentation on professional branding focused on the importance of creating oneself as a brand option for potential employers before applying for jobs. This presentation stressed the importance of using social media and the internet to one's advantage, that is, to advertise oneself professionally. Additionally, the presentation on creating a professional identity, highlighted how as employees, students can advance themselves professionally and make themselves more valuable to their organization.

The presentation touched on creating an ethical compass, being flexible and adaptable, as well as the importance of displaying soft skills such as critical thinking, being tech savvy and having good communication skills.

Co-op Ed Professional Development Seminar

ach year the Co-op Ed Unit hosts Professional
Development Seminars designed to aid the holistic development of students. At these sessions, students benefit from interaction with key industry players who help them to apply the theory that they have learned in class.

Given the challenges resulting from the global pandemic, a number of our partnering organizations began closing branches, resulting in unemployment or a shift in focus. It therefore became even more important that students learn how to navigate this ever-changing employment landscape.



The Seminar held in March 2022 was therefore aptly themed "Covid -19 and the Job Market". The presenter, Ms. Venice Irving spoke about jobs for the future and the general direction of the job market and some of the challenges that have resulted from the Covid-19 pandemic. She posited that with technological and medical innovation, as well as increased automation, more developed countries have the ability to recover faster from the pandemic and other economic struggles caused as a result, as opposed to smaller countries that are more vulnerable. The pandemic brought about many of these innovations and new ways to make money, contributing to a widening of the wealth gap.

In closing she encouraged students to think of the job market as a global competition, to up-skill themselves and think innovatively and aim to be solution oriented, finding ways to anticipate what the problem will be and solve it.

major role in ensuring that students and
employers have a mutually beneficial
Co-op Ed experience. With the assistance of
administrative support staff, Mrs. Roberts-Brown
has ensured that the students and the
employers receive documentation before the
commencement of Co-op Ed.

Having ensured that students are exposed to various aspects of professional development modules including the delivery of modules that focus on Co-operative Education, she takes pride in knowing that they will perform very well in the workplace. She explained that it has been such a rewarding experience as the feedback from

the employers convinces her that the students are being well prepared for the internship exercise.

When the pandemic hit in March 2020 and office doors closed, her team responded by allowing students, who had just started their work experience, to complete in time. Students were permitted to prepare a portfolio and answer related questions based on simulation exercises, to see how they would resolve issues that may arise on the job. Mrs. Roberts- Brown and her team also had to review their syllabi and the objectives stated therein to reflect the current realities. Students were further invited to attend seminars that focused on different aspects of career development to prepare them for the workplace. "Students should take career development classes that are practical in application so they will want to be part of the team. We cannot afford to not place emphasis on the importance of soft skills and people's attitude in the workplace," she said.

She however lamented that "sometimes it is difficult to find employers to work along with us to give the students the well needed experience."

When asked about the benefits of Internship to the students in SOBA, she stated that, "When a student can apply what has been taught in a practical way and learn from others, that is priceless. We are truly grateful to those stakeholders who have jumped on board from very early and have remained with us, as a result of the relationships that SOBA and the Co-op Ed Unit have built over the years with so many companies and entrepreneurs."

International Perspective - Botho University, Botswana





World Association of Co-operative Education (WACE) aims at forming and forging bonds between higher education institutions, employers and partners across various industries. These relationships aid in the transitioning of students into the work world, by providing them with a host of necessary skills in the classroom paired with internships and work experience. Students have the opportunity to test and refine these skills, as well as learn new ones before permanent placement. The Botho University in Botswana is a WACE member and to equip their students with a necessary skill, they have incorporated the use of

technology in their teaching and learning methods. Botho recognized that with the changing job market, their graduates would need to be tech savvy as it would provide them with an upper hand for greater employability. Since becoming a WACE member in 2021, Botho University has acknowledged that given the varying internet access challenges their students face, participation in virtual internships is significant.

was able to use the knowledge gained in class to make informed decisions and brainstorm new ideas for the conceptual designs," remarked Javian, who was placed at the National Environmental Planning Agency. in Jamaica and the process surrounding master planning." Javian intends to use the skills honed to help him become a valuable member to his industry.

athaniel explained, "The whole point of internship is to experience the working world and gain as much knowledge as you can to prepare you for the time that you will enter the workforce. Internship allows students to engage with their industry from the inside, giving them the opportunity to apply what they have learned in the classroom." He acknowledged that the skills and competences acquired from classroom sessions were crucial to the proper execution of his duties while on internship as they allowed him to understand what was expected of him as a Quantity Surveyor and to execute those duties to the best of his ability. He spoke highly of the opportunity afforded him to network with members of industry and sharpening his communication skills. He noted, "My

employers have a great staff and a wide variety of clients ranging from private to governmental. Because of this, I have encountered many individuals, both locally and abroad and I was able to make useful connections with most of them.
