UTech's Co-op Ed students have impacted many departments within NHT. Their assignments have been in areas such as:

And although these areas have been affected by budgetary constraints, the NHT is dedicated to its continued participation in the programme as this is further seen as enhancing the company's image via social responsibility.

Organization and Supervision

NHT is pleased to report that the Co-op Ed programme is well organized and the School/Unit effectively communicates in ensuring that students are placed. The students have also brought quality and good skill-sets to the organization.

The organization ensures that students are trained and supervised as this is critical to the success of the partnership. UTech Students Score Big On Work Ethics in Employer Survey

During 2011-2012 academic year, twenty Co-op Ed employers completed a questionnaire, part of which asked that they rate their interns' employability skill-sets using the following scale: excellent, good, fair, weak and not observed/ not assessed.

Our respondents were from several industries and who facilitated students from across various disciplines. Below is a table borrowed from a larger report which points to the success of the Co-op Ed programme. The table is intended to highlight *Work Ethics* as one critical employability skill-set on which students received the highest rating from employers.
